The Delphi Series DCS, 4.5-14V input, single output, non-isolated Point of Load DC/DC converters are the latest offering from a world leader in power systems technology and manufacturing -- Delta Electronics, Inc. The DCS series provides a programmable output voltage from 0.59 V to 5.0V using an external resistor and has flexible and programmable tracking features to enable a variety of startup voltages as well as tracking between power modules. 


Figure 1: Converter efficiency vs. output current (5.0Vout)




Figure 3: Converter efficiency vs. output current (2.5 Vout)




Figure 2: Converter efficiency vs. output current (3.3 Vout)





Figure 4: Converter efficiency vs. output current (1.8Vout)




Figure 7: Output ripple & noise at 12Vin, 5.0V/6A out CH1:VOUT, 20mV/div, 1uS/div




Figure 8: Output ripple & noise at 12Vin, 3.3V/6A out CH1:VOUT, 20mV/div, 1uS/div




Figure 9: Output ripple & noise at 12Vin, 2.5V/6A out CH1:VOUT, 20mV/div, 1uS/div




Figure 11: Output ripple & noise at 12Vin, 1.2 V/6A out CH1:VOUT, 20mV/div, 1uS/div




Figure 10: Output ripple & noise at 12Vin, 1.8V/6A out CH1:VOUT, 20mV/div, 1uS/div




Figure 12: Output ripple & noise at 12Vin, 0.59 V/6A out CH1:VOUT, 20mV/div, 1uS/div




Figure 13: Turn on delay time at 12Vin, 5.0V/6A out
(Top trace : VOUT, 2V/div; Bottom trace: VIN, 5V/div; 2mS/div)




Figure 15: Turn on delay time at 12Vin, 2.5V/6A out
Top trace: VOUT, 1V/div; Bottom trace: VIN, 5V/div; 2mS/div)




Figure 14: Turn on delay time at 12Vin, 3.3V/6A out
(Top trace: VOUT, 1V/div; Bottom trace: VIN, 5V/div; 2mS/div)




Figure 16: Turn on delay time at 12Vin, 1.8V/6A out
(Top trace : VOUT, 0.5V/div, Bottom trace: VIN, 5V/div; 2mS/div)




Figure 17: Turn on delay time at 12Vin, 1.2V/6A out
(Top trace: VOUT, 0.5V/div; Bottom trace: VIN, 5V/div; 2mS/div)




Figure 18: Turn on delay time at 12 Vin, 0.59 V/6A out




Figure 19: Typical transient response to step load change at 1A/μS from 100%~ 50%~100% of lo, max at 12Vin, 5.0Vout (Cout = 1uF ceramic, 47uF+10μFceramic) CH1: VOUT, 0.1V/div, 200uS/div




Figure 20: Typical transient response to step load change at 1A/μS from 100%~ 50%~100% of lo, max at 12Vin, 3.3Vout (Cout = 1uF ceramic, 47uF+10μFceramic) CH1: VOUT, 0.1V/div, 200uS/div




Figure 25: Output short circuit current 12Vin, 5.0Vout
Top trace: Vo, 1V/div; Bottom trace: Io, 5A/div; 20ms/div




Figure 26: Output short circuit current 12Vin, 0.59 Vout




Figure 27:Tracking function, Vtracking=5.5 V, Vout= 5.0V, full load

Top trace:Vtracking, 1V/div; Bottom trace: Vout,1 V/div;1ms/div






Figure 28:Tracking function, Vtracking=0.8V, Vout= 0.59V, full load

**Figure 30:** Peak-peak output noise and startup transient measurement test setup.




Figure 31: Output voltage and efficiency measurement test setup

## **DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS**

#### **Input Source Impedance**

To maintain low noise and ripple at the input voltage, it is critical to use low ESR capacitors at the input to the module. A highly inductive source can affect the stability of the module. An input capacitance must be placed close to the modules input pins to filter ripple current and ensure module stability in the presence of inductive traces that supply the input voltage to the module.

# **DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS (CON.)**

#### **Safety Considerations**

For safety-agency approval the power module must be installed in compliance with the spacing and separation requirements of the end-use safety agency standards.

For the converter output to be considered meeting the requirements of safety extra-low voltage (SELV), the input must meet SELV requirements. The power module has extra-low voltage (ELV) outputs when all inputs are ELV.

The input to these units is to be provided with a maximum 10A fuse in the ungrounded lead.

#### Input Under voltage Lockout

At input voltages below the input under voltage lockout limit, the module operation is disabled. The module will begin to operate at an input voltage above the under voltage lockout turn-on threshold.

#### **Over-Current Protection**

To provide protection in an output over load fault condition, the unit is equipped with internal over-current protection. When the over-current protection is triggered, the unit enters hiccup mode. The units operate normally once the fault condition is removed.

## FEATURES DESCRIPTIONS

#### Remote On/Off

The DCS series power modules have an On/Off pin for remote On/Off operation. Both positive and negative On/Off logic options are available in the DCS series power modules.




Figure 32: Positive remote On/Off implementation

For positive logic module, connect an open collector (NPN) transistor or open drain (N channel) MOSFET between the On/Off pin and the GND pin (see figure32). Positive logic On/Off signal turns the module ON during the logic high and turns the module OFF during the logic low. When the positive On/Off function is not used, leave the pin floating or tie to Vin (module will be On).




Figure 33: Negative remote On/Off implementation

For negative logic module, the On/Off pin is pulled high with an external pull-up  $5k\Omega$  resistor (see figure 33). Negative logic On/Off signal turns the module OFF during logic high and turns the module ON during logic low. If the negative On/Off function is not used, leave the pin floating or tie to GND. (module will be on)

# **FEATURES DESCRIPTIONS (CON.)**

#### **Remote Sense**

The DCS provide Vo remote sensing to achieve proper regulation at the load points and reduce effects of distribution losses on output line. In the event of an open remote sense line, the module shall maintain local sense regulation through an internal resistor. The module shall correct for a total of 0.5V of loss. The remote sense line impedance shall be <  $10\Omega$ .




Figure 34: Effective circuit configuration for remote sense operation

#### **Output Voltage Programming**


**Figure 35:** Circuit configuration for programming output voltage using an external resistor

The output voltage of the DCS can be programmed to any voltage between 0.59Vdc and 5.0Vdc by connecting one resistor (shown as Rtrim in Figure 35) between the TRIM and GND pins of the module. Without this external resistor, the output voltage of the module is 0.59 Vdc. To calculate the value of the resistor Rtrim for a particular output voltage Vo, please use the following equation:


$$Rtrim = \left[ \frac{5.91}{Vo - 0.591} \right] K\Omega$$

Rtrim is the external resistor in  $k\Omega$ 

Vo is the desired output voltage.

For example, to program the output voltage of the DNS module to 5.0Vdc, Rtrim is calculated as follows:

$$Rtrim = \left[\frac{5.91}{5.0 - 0.591}\right] K\Omega = 1.34 K\Omega$$

Certain restrictions apply on the output voltage set point depending on the input voltage. These are shown in the Output Voltage vs. Input Voltage Set Point Area plot in Figure 36. The Upper Limit curve shows that for output voltages of 0.9V and lower, the input voltage must be lower than the maximum of 14V. The Lower Limit curve shows that for output voltages of 3.8V and higher, the input voltage needs to be larger than the minimum of 4.5V.

# FEATURE DESCRIPTIONS (CON.)

## **Voltage Margining**




Figure 37: Circuit configuration for output voltage margining

Output voltage margining can be implemented in the DCS modules by connecting a resistor, R margin-up, from the Trim pin to the ground pin for margining-up the output voltage and by connecting a resistor, R margin-down, from the Trim pin to the output pin for margining-down. Figure 37 shows the circuit configuration for output voltage margining. If unused, leave the trim pin unconnected. A calculation tool is available from the evaluation procedure which computes the values of R margin-up and R margin-down for a specific output voltage and margin percentage.

#### **Output Voltage Sequencing**

The DCS 12V 6A modules include a sequencing feature, EZ-SEQUENCE that enables users to implement various types of output voltage sequencing in their applications. This is accomplished via an additional sequencing pin. When not using the sequencing feature, either tie the SEQ pin to VIN or leave it unconnected.

When an analog voltage is applied to the SEQ pin, the output voltage tracks this voltage until the output reaches the set-point voltage. The final value of the SEQ voltage must be set higher than the set-point voltage of the module. The output voltage follows the voltage on the SEQ pin on a one-to-one basis. By connecting multiple modules together, multiple modules can track their output voltages to the voltage applied on the SEQ pin. For proper voltage sequencing, first, input voltage is applied to the module. The On/Off pin of the module is left unconnected (or tied to GND for negative logic modules or tied to VIN for positive logic modules) so that the module is ON by default. After applying input voltage to the module, a minimum 10msec delay is required before applying voltage on the SEQ pin. This delay gives the module enough time to complete its internal power-up soft-start cycle. During the delay time, the SEQ pin should be held close to ground (nominally 50mV ± 20 mV). This is required to keep the internal op-amp out of saturation thus preventing output overshoot during the start of the sequencing ramp. By selecting resistor R1 (see Figure. 39) according to the following equation

$$R1 = \left[ \frac{24950}{Vin - 0.05} \right] \Omega$$





Figure 38: Sequential Start-up

The voltage at the sequencing pin will be 50mV when the sequencing signal is at zero.

# FEATURE DESCRIPTIONS (CON.)

After the 10msec delay, an analog voltage is applied to the SEQ pin and the output voltage of the module will track this voltage on a one-to-one volt bases until the output reaches the set-point voltage. To initiate simultaneous shutdown of the modules, the SEQ pin voltage is lowered in a controlled manner. The output voltage of the modules tracks the voltages below their set-point voltages on a one-to-one basis. A valid input voltage must be maintained until the tracking and output voltages reach ground potential.

When using the EZ-SEQUENCETM feature to control start-up of the module, pre-bias immunity during startup is disabled. The pre-bias immunity feature of the module relies on the module being in the diode-mode during start-up. When using the EZ-SEQUENCETM feature, modules goes through an internal set-up time of 10msec, and will be in synchronous rectification mode when the voltage at the SEQ pin is applied. This will result in the module sinking current if a pre-bias voltage is present at the output of the module.

#### **Power Good**

The DCS modules provide a Power Good (PGOOD) signal that is implemented with an open-drain output to indicate that the output voltage is within the regulation limits of the power module. The PGOOD signal will be de-asserted to a low state if any condition such as over temperature, over current or loss of regulation occurs that would result in the output voltage going  $\pm 10\%$  outside the set point value. The PGOOD terminal should be connected through a pull up resistor (suggested value  $100K\Omega$ ) to a source of 5VDC or lower.

#### Monotonic Start-up and Shutdown

The DCS 6A modules have monotonic start-up and shutdown behavior for any combination of rated input voltage, output current and operating temperature range.

#### THERMAL CONSIDERATIONS


Thermal management is an important part of the system design. To ensure proper, reliable operation, sufficient cooling of the power module is needed over the entire temperature range of the module. Convection cooling is usually the dominant mode of heat transfer.

Hence, the choice of equipment to characterize the thermal performance of the power module is a wind tunnel.

## **Thermal Testing Setup**

Delta's DC/DC power modules are characterized in heated vertical wind tunnels that simulate the thermal environments encountered in most electronics equipment. This type of equipment commonly uses vertically mounted circuit cards in cabinet racks in which the power modules are mounted.

The following figure shows the wind tunnel characterization setup. The power module is mounted on a test PWB and is vertically positioned within the wind tunnel.





#### Thermal Derating

Heat can be removed by increasing airflow over the module. To enhance system reliability, the power module should always be operated below the maximum operating temperature. If the temperature exceeds the maximum module temperature, reliability of the unit may be affected.

**Figure 41:** Temperature measurement location The allowed maximum hot spot temperature is defined at 120  $^{\circ}$ 







Figure 42: Output current vs. ambient temperature and air velocity @Vin=12V, Vout=5.0V(Either Orientation)




**Figure 43:** Output current vs. ambient temperature and air velocity @Vin=12V, Vout=3.3V(Either Orientation)




**Figure 44:** Output current vs. ambient temperature and air velocity @Vin=12V, Vout=2.5V(Either Orientation)



**Figure 45:** Output current vs. ambient temperature and air velocity @Vin=12V, Vout=1.8V(Either Orientation)




**Figure 46:** Output current vs. ambient temperature and air velocity @Vin=12V, Vout=1.2V(Either Orientation)




**Figure 47:** Output current vs. ambient temperature and air velocity @Vin=12V, Vout=0.59 V(Either Orientation)



# LEAD (Sn/Pb) PROCESS RECOMMEND TEMP. PROFILE




